## AN ACT

To direct the Department of Homeland Security to undertake a study on emergency communications.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Amateur Radio Emer-
- 3 gency Communications Enhancement Act of 2009".
- 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 5 Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) Nearly 700,000 amateurs radio operators in 7 the United States are licensed by the Federal Com-8 munications Commission in the Amateur Radio
- 9 Service.

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- (2) Amateur Radio Service operators provide, on a volunteer basis, a valuable public sector service to their communities, their States, and to the Nation, especially in the area of national and international disaster communications.
  - (3) Emergency and disaster relief communications services by volunteer Amateur Radio Service operators have consistently and reliably been provided before, during, and after floods, hurricanes, tornadoes, forest fires, earthquakes, blizzards, train accidents, chemical spills and other disasters. These communications services include services in connection with significant examples, such as—
- 23 (A) hurricanes Katrina, Rita, Hugo, and 24 Andrew;

- 1 (B) the relief effort at the World Trade 2 Center and the Pentagon following the 2001 3 terrorist attacks; and
- 4 (C) the Oklahoma City bombing in April 5 1995.
  - (4) Amateur Radio Service has formal agreements for the provision of volunteer emergency communications activities with the Department of Homeland Security, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the National Weather Service, the National Communications System, and the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials, as well as with disaster relief agencies, including the American National Red Cross and the Salvation Army.
    - (5) Section 1 of the joint resolution entitled "Joint Resolution to recognize the achievements of radio amateurs, and to establish support for such amateurs as national policy", approved October 22, 1994 (Public Law 103–408), included a finding that stated: "Reasonable accommodation should be made for the effective operation of amateur radio from residences, private vehicles and public areas, and the regulation at all levels of government should facili-

- tate and encourage amateur radio operations as apublic benefit.".
- 3 (6) Section 1805(c) of the Homeland Security
  4 Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 757(c)) directs the Regional
  5 Emergency Communications Coordinating Working
  6 Group of the Department of Homeland Security to
  7 coordinate their activities with ham and amateur
  8 radio operators among the 11 other emergency orga9 nizations such as ambulance services, law enforce10 ment, and others.
  - (7) Amateur Radio Service, at no cost to taxpayers, provides a fertile ground for technical selftraining in modern telecommunications, electronic technology, and emergency communications techniques and protocols.
  - (8) There is a strong Federal interest in the effective performance of Amateur Radio Service stations, and that performance must be given—
- 19 (A) support at all levels of government; 20 and
- 21 (B) protection against unreasonable regu-22 lation and impediments to the provision of the 23 valuable communications provided by such sta-24 tions.

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1	SEC. 3. STUDY OF ENHANCED USES OF AMATEUR RADIO IN
2	EMERGENCY AND DISASTER RELIEF COMMU-
3	NICATION AND FOR RELIEF OF RESTRIC-
4	TIONS.
5	(a) AUTHORITY.—Not later than 180 days after the
6	date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland
7	Security shall—
8	(1) undertake a study on the uses and capabili-
9	ties of Amateur Radio Service communications in
10	emergencies and disaster relief; and
11	(2) submit a report on the findings of the Sec-
12	retary to Congress.
13	(b) Scope of the Study.—The study required by
14	this section shall—
15	(1) include a review of the importance of ama-
16	teur radio emergency communications in furtherance
17	of homeland security missions relating to disasters,
18	severe weather, and other threats to lives and prop-
19	erty in the United States, as well as recommenda-
20	tions for—
21	(A) enhancements in the voluntary deploy-
22	ment of amateur radio licensees in disaster and
23	emergency communications and disaster relief
24	efforts; and
25	(B) improved integration of amateur radio
26	operators in planning and furtherance of the

1	Department of Homeland Security initiatives;
2	and
3	(2)(A) identify impediments to enhanced Ama-
4	teur Radio Service communications, such as the ef-
5	fects of unreasonable or unnecessary private land
6	use regulations on residential antenna installations;
7	and
8	(B) make recommendations regarding such im-
9	pediments for consideration by other Federal depart-
10	ments, agencies, and Congress.
11	(c) USE OF EXPERTISE AND INFORMATION.—In con-
12	ducting the study required by this section, the Secretary
13	of Homeland Security shall utilize the expertise of stake-
14	holder entities and organizations, including the amateur
15	radio, emergency response, and disaster communications
16	communities.
